Skill Reminder

• A simple sentence expresses only one complete thought.

• A compound sentence is made up of two or more simple sentences, usually joined by and, or, or but.

Use a comma before the conjunction.

• Avoid combining two sentences with nothing, or only a comma, between them.





- ▶ On the line following each sentence, write *simple* sentence or compound sentence.
