Some people say that you can't compare apples and oranges, but that's not true. Comparing apples with oranges is easy! First, look at their color. Oranges come in only the color orange. *Nobody* likes the color orange! Apples, on the other hand, come in many beautiful, eye-pleasing shades. There are green apples and yellow apples, red apples and yellowish-red apples. There are deep red apples and light red apples. To sum it up, *everyone* loves the colors of apples.

There are also different kinds of apples on grocery store shelves. You can buy red Delicious, golden Delicious, Jonathan, Granny Smith, Winesap, or several other kinds of apples. Red Delicious apples taste best. In the grocery stores in my town, oranges usually come in just two varieties: seedless or seeded.

Next, let's compare ease of eating. An orange has an ugly, thick rind on the outside. You have to peel off the rind to get to the part you eat. That's too much work to do just to get a bite of fruit. Apples, by contrast, can be eaten without being peeled. You can just bite right in.

Oranges and apples are similar in some ways. Both fruits were brought to this country from Europe. Apples were brought to us from England, and oranges were brought from Spain and Portugal. Both fruits can be sweet and juicy, and both fruits can be used to make juice. It is clear from the comparison done here, though, that apples are better than oranges in every way.
