Using State-of-Being Verbs

A state-of-being verb must agree with its subject. Regular verbs and most irregular verbs add an -s or -es to the present form when the subject is singular.



Singular Subject

Plural Subject

Jack looks happy.

They look happy.

The past form of the verb stays the same for singular and plural subjects.



Singular Subject

Plural Subject

Donna looked nice.

Both girls looked nice.

The verb *be* is an irregular verb.

Singular First person Second person Third person	Present I am you are he is	Past I was you were he was
Plural First person Second person Third person	we are you are they are	we were you were they were

The past participle of *be* is *been*. Use *been* with *have*, *has*, and *had* to form the perfect tenses.

EXAMPLES

Fred has been sick.

They have been busy all day.

Mike had been their helper.

The present participle of *be* is *being*. Use *being* with the helping verb *be* to show the progressive form.

EXAMPLES

Donna is being nice.

Jack was being friendly.

Here are some common mistakes to avoid:

1. Sometimes people leave out the *be* verb or part of the verb phrase in a sentence.

EXAMPLES

Incorrect:

The quarterback fast!

Correct:

The quarterback is fast!

Incorrect:

I be ready soon.

Correct:

I will be ready soon.

2. Sometimes people use be instead of the correct present form.

EXAMPLES

Incorrect:

They be good friends.

Correct:

They are good friends.

Incorrect:

Roberto be my brother.

Correct:

Roberto is my brother.
